Admission requirements	Applicants from Nordic countries: Citizenship in a Nordic country, or not. International applicants: Higher Education Entrance Qualification and certified language requirements in english is not needed
Relevance for study Program	Can be a part of Bachelor in "Embodied Nordicity Knowledge"
Course content	The course gives students an introduction to the field of High North Movements in the framework and concept of Nordicity. Nordicity will be seen as a system, a phenomenon, a business sector and a sector of society. The course introduces Nordicity Movements from a regional Arctic standpoint to a global context.
Learning outcome	<p>Knowledge: The student will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Get a comprehensive introduction to the movement terminology and its areas of operation. This includes a basic understanding of context, products in relation to the movements, cultural impact and other related services and offers. - be familiar with basic research and development work in the High North Movement field, including academic history and knowledge of Nordicity in society. <p>Skills: The student will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Be able to explain and use the basic knowledge related to High North Movements - be able to reflect on the movements as a field of study and be able to use basic literature on the subject. <p>General competencies The student will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Learn about central academic and professional ethical challenges in the High North Movement field. - be able to convey the basic academic material and sources used in today's Nordicity industry, and to reflect on new, innovative Movements and more responsible and sustainable approaches. - be able to explain the High North Movement and its role in the world; and have knowledge of key aspects of its historical development.

Teaching methods	<p>Students will work individually with the learning material and tasks through:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Online Lectures - Individual studies - Participation in discussions in groups, colloquium work and online - Use of library and the Internet - Individual assignments - Presentations to the class - Mandatory excursion and training sessions
Assessment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 70% attendance is required, as well as participation in the excursion, in order to take the exam. - One day written home exam, as well as a practical individual presentation - Written home exam counts 30% of final grade, practical presentation counts 70%. - The written and practical exam will together constitute the final grade. The written and oral examination can be completed in Norwegian or English.
Re-sti exam	A re-sit exam will be arranged for this course
